Program Updates

Prerana Setu

Prerana Setu is an online learning experience that creates a bridge (or Setu) between subject matter experts from across the globe and high school students. The idea is to provide students with exposure to various fields, understand the requirements to enter those fields, explore different career paths, and become aware of the opportunities and challenges within each field.

In the third phase of this initiative, around 10 sessions were conducted in the first quarter of 2023, where entrepreneurs from different domains, such as design, psychology, forensic accounting, etc., interacted with students.




A computational social science platform engaged in evidence-based research, analysis, and policy-making to build a resilient future

JPF Analytics has come a long way since it celebrated its first anniversary in October 2022 with a webinar attended by Padma Vibhushan, Dr. Raghunath Mashelkar, and Dr. Priya Nagaraj, the COO of Pune Knowledge Cluster (PKC), as chief guests.

The team has been collaborating with the PKC and Carnegie Mellon University to estimate the number of excess COVID-19-associated deaths in Pune City during the first and second waves of the COVID-19 pandemic. Data were combined from statistical modeling, public surveys, and media sources to compute excess mortality estimates. The team recently submitted these findings for review in the academic peer-reviewed journal PLOS Global Public Health.

JPF Analytics also launched a new education and outreach initiative. Each month, the team will host an open-to-all session on topics relevant to computational social science, analysis, research, and policymaking. The team has already conducted two sessions: one in February called "Analysis Pipelines: Raw Data to Refined Insights" and one in March called "Data for Social Good: Introduction Computational to Social Science." 



Figure 5. Results from the wisdom of crowds public survey. N = 280.



Fundraising Team Updates

In the first quarter of 2023, we have witnessed inspiring milestones and heartwarming moments that exemplify the transformative impact of the fundraising team's collective efforts. From successful events to meaningful partnerships, we have been able to extend our reach and amplify our impact in various areas of need. Below are some of the highlights we would like to share:

- 2023 fundraising began in Austin, TX with a unique event. Nivi Panwalker organized a jewelry stall and created video clips to promote JPF to women in the area, resulting in a net profit of approximately \$3,500.
- Swapneeta Date, one of our volunteers, arranged a fundraiser to celebrate the arrival of her baby son, Rian.
- Vidya Tai Hardikar-Sapre from our fundraising team joined forces with Aakash Chowkase from the Sanghatan team, reaching out to nearly 80 people in the Bay Area, California, including some of our donors. Among them is our oldest donor and well-wisher, Mr. Prabhakar Sathe, who is 93 years old. His presence and blessings serve as inspiration for our volunteers and donors.
- In 2022, we initiated a new venture called "Partnership in Development" with the support of Bay Area Marathi Mandal and IDRF. These organizations are backing our projects such as Mukti and Anandshala.
- At the Bay Area Mandal Program, our volunteer Bilwa Bhanap organized a booth.
- Dr. Shubhangi and Dr. Jagdish Thakur generously donated a significant amount to our Jnana Prabodhini Prashala project in Solapur, and IDRF agreed to match their donation.

Our fundraising team aims to organize three campaigns this year. We kicked off our "Arogya Sakhi" campaign on International Women's Day and our next campaign will focus on "Sponsor a Child" for Guru Pournima.
